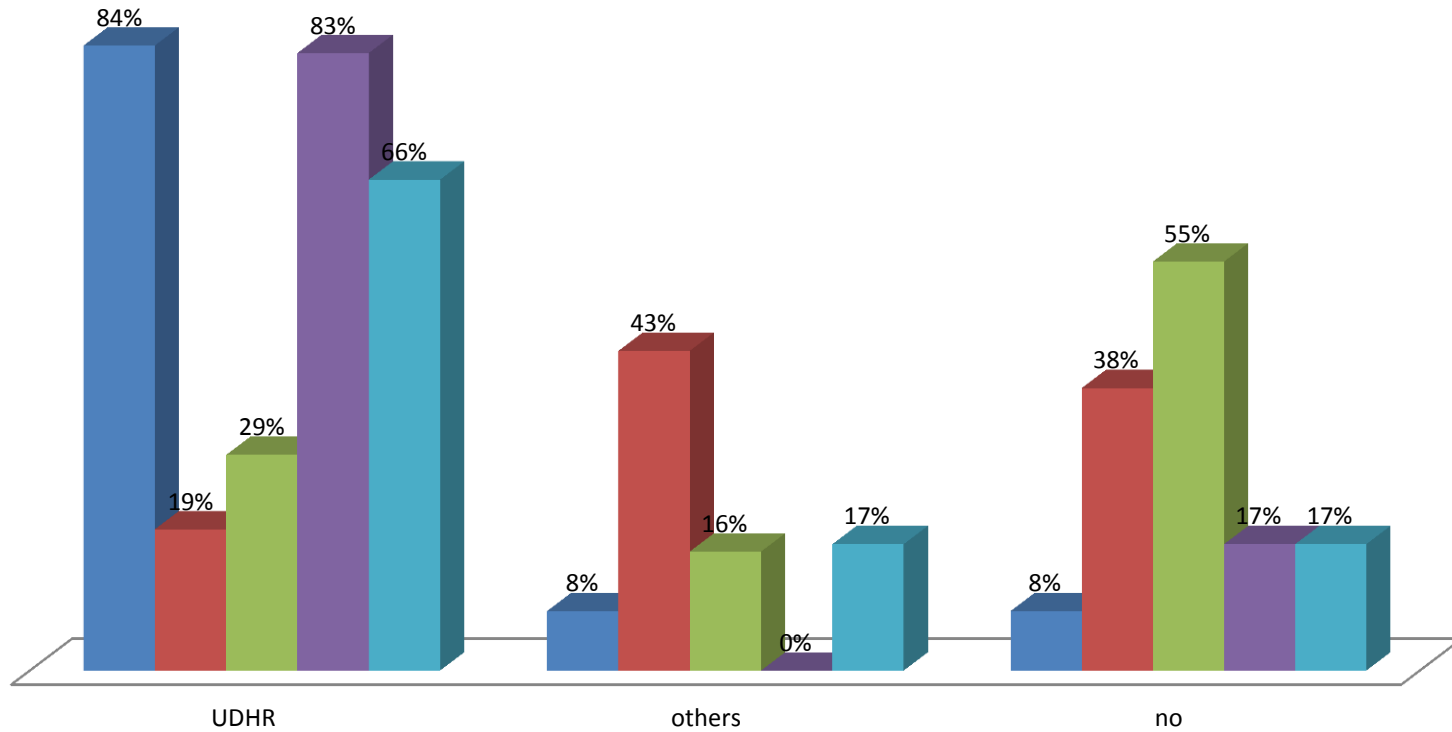

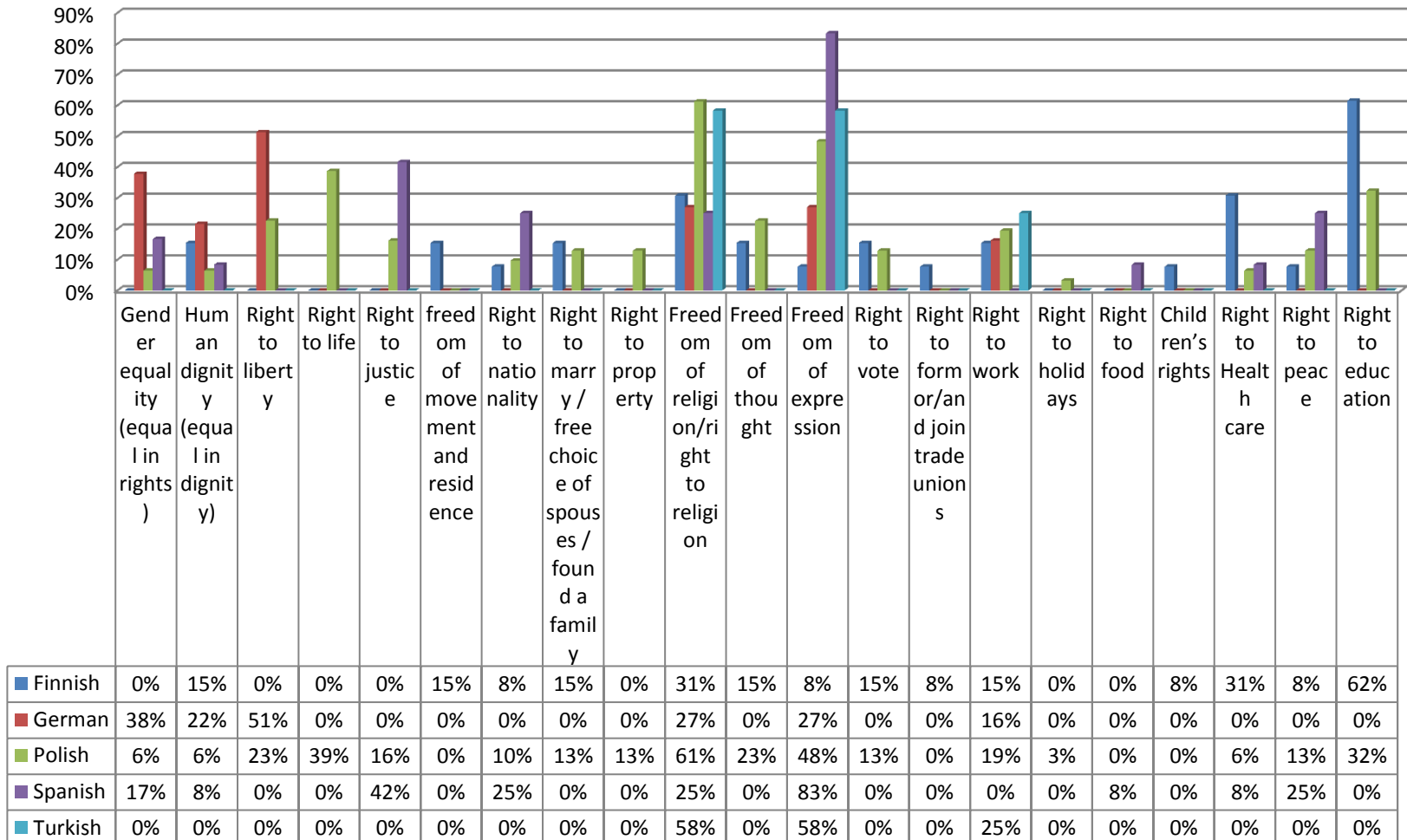

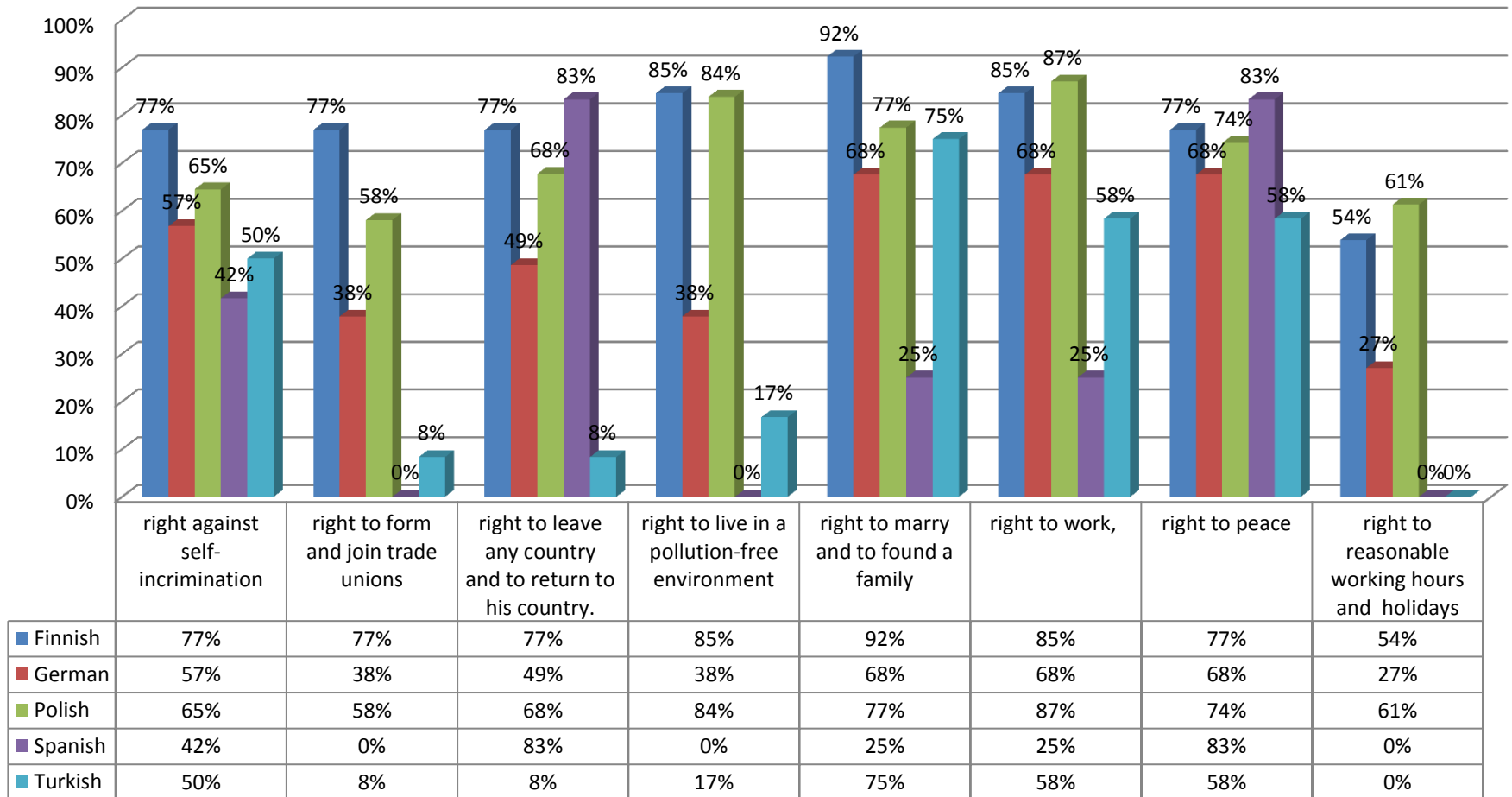

4. Which of these rights is a human right, which is not?

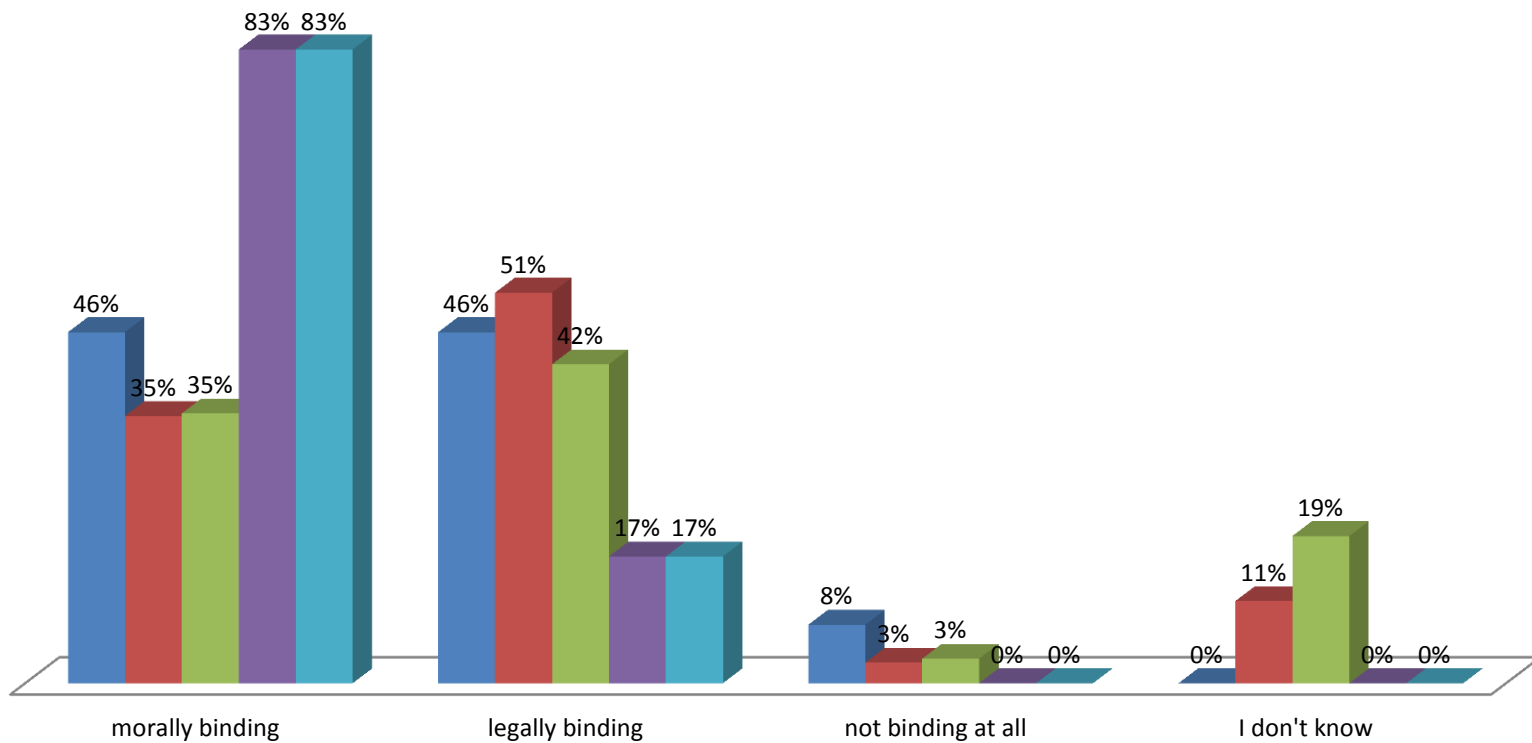


4. Which right is a Human Right?



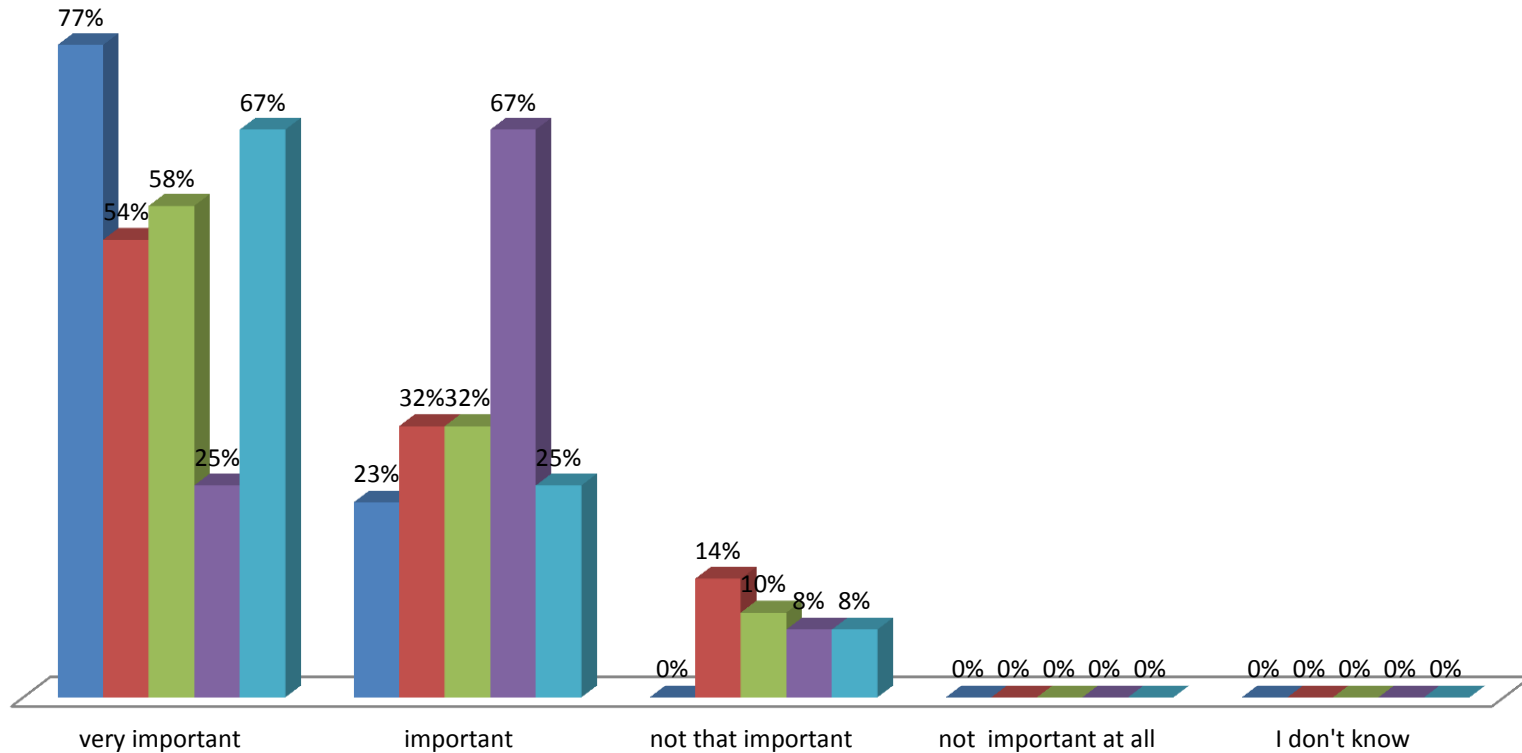

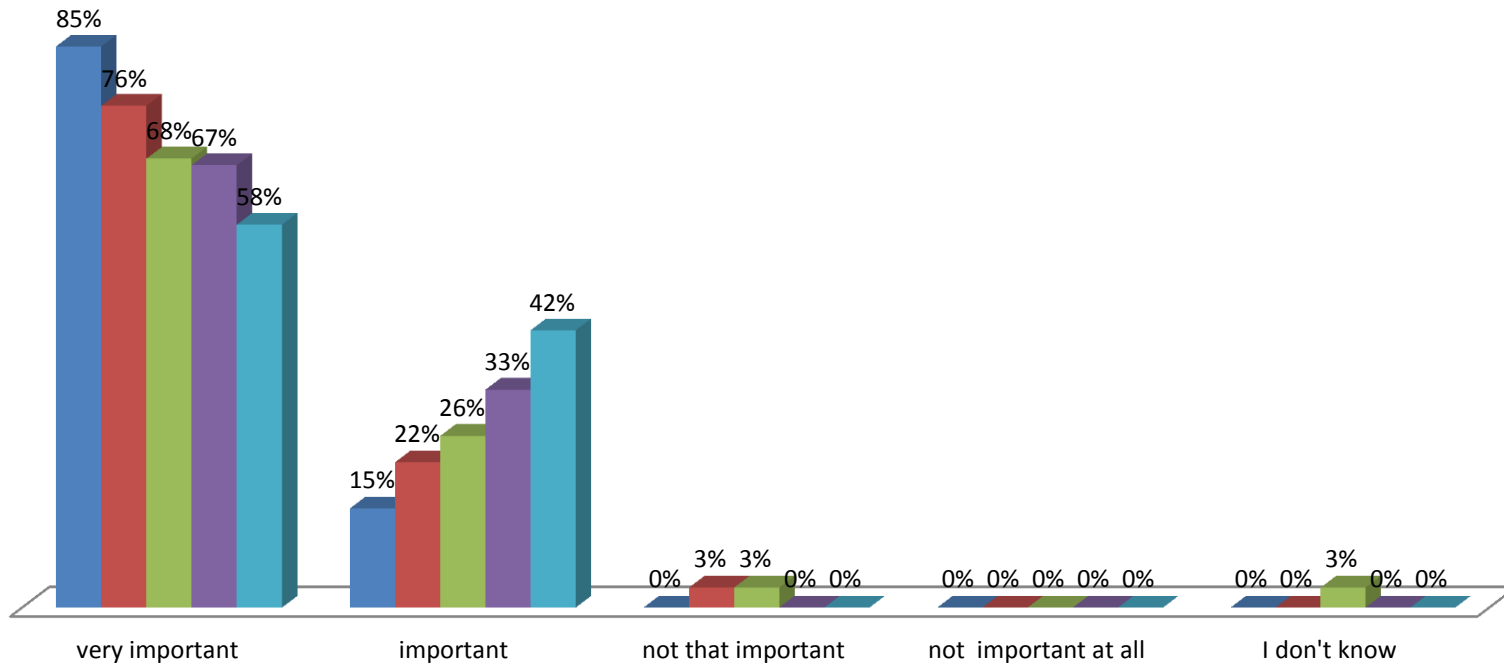
6a) Everyone has a right to a nationality

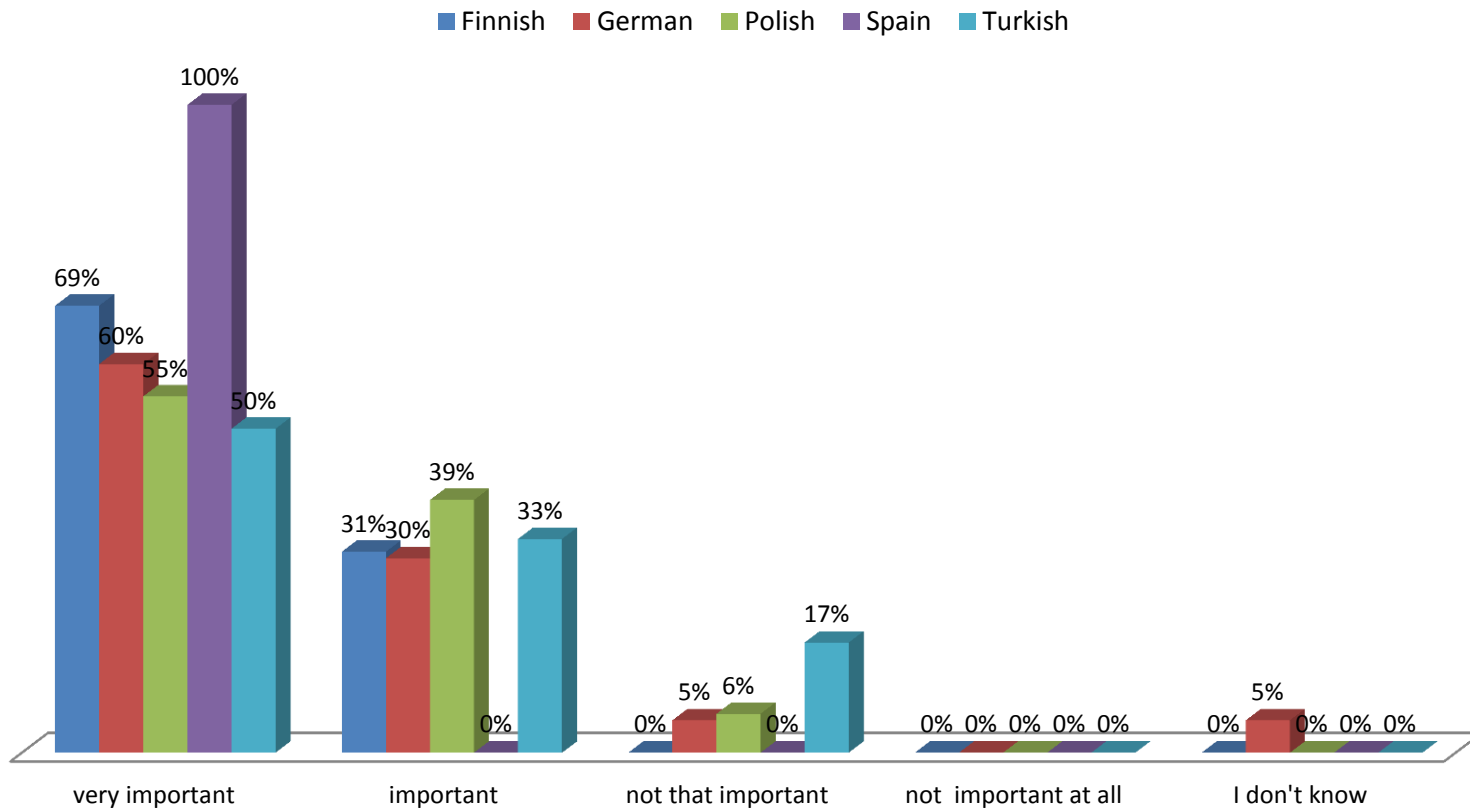


6b) Everyone charged with a penal offence has the right to be presumed innocent until proved guilty according to law in a public trial at which he has had all the guarantees necessary for his defence.

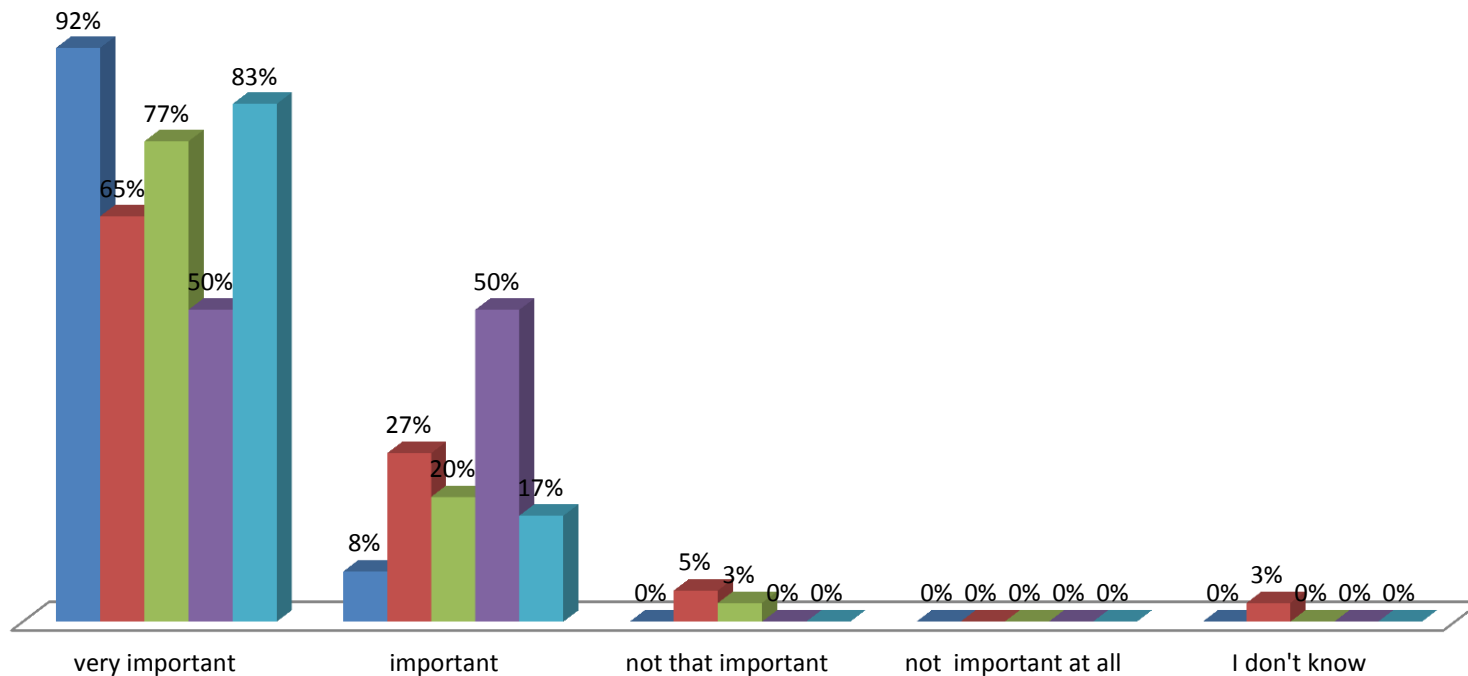


6c) Everyone, without any discrimination, has the right to equal pay for equal work.

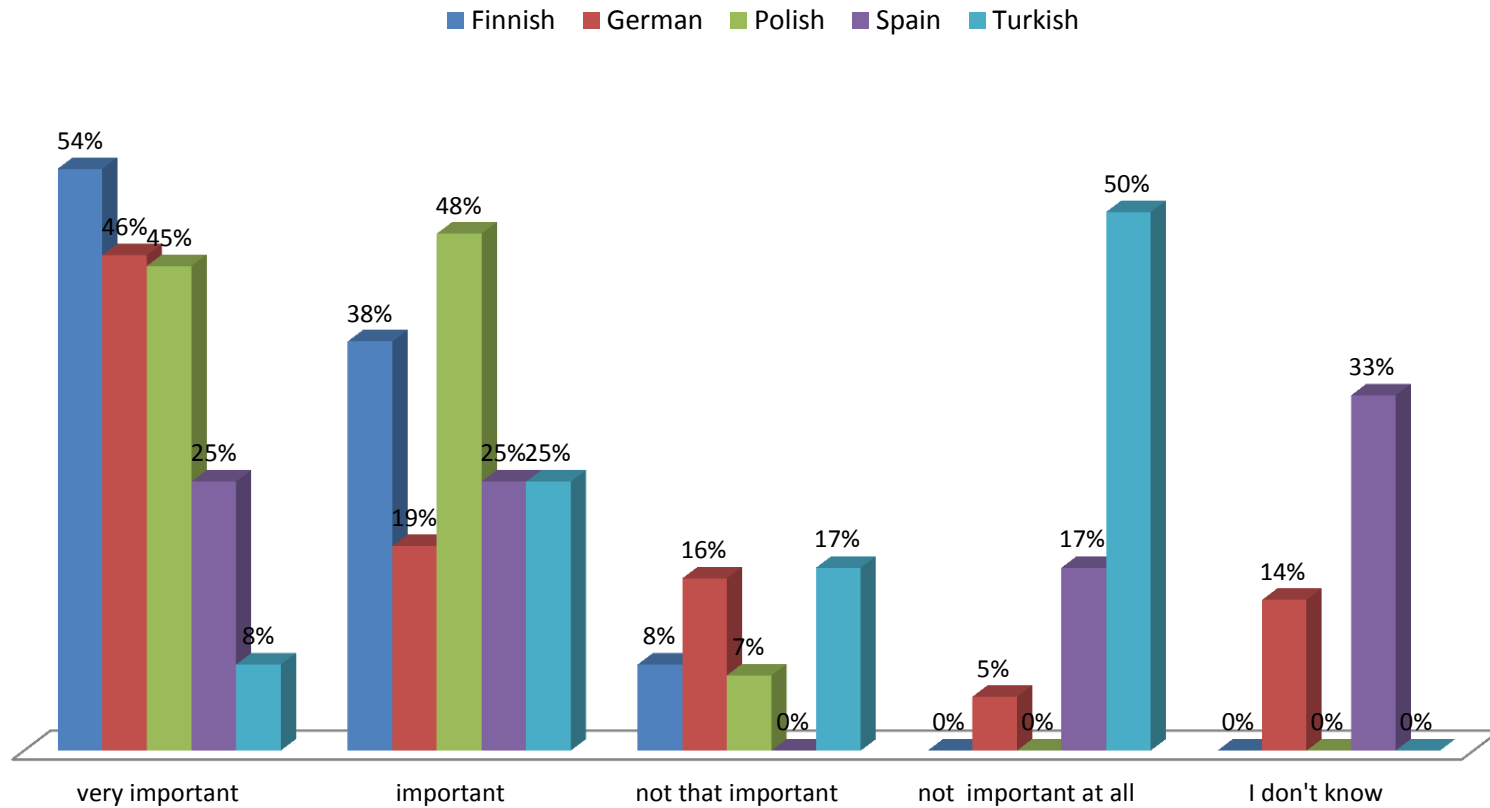

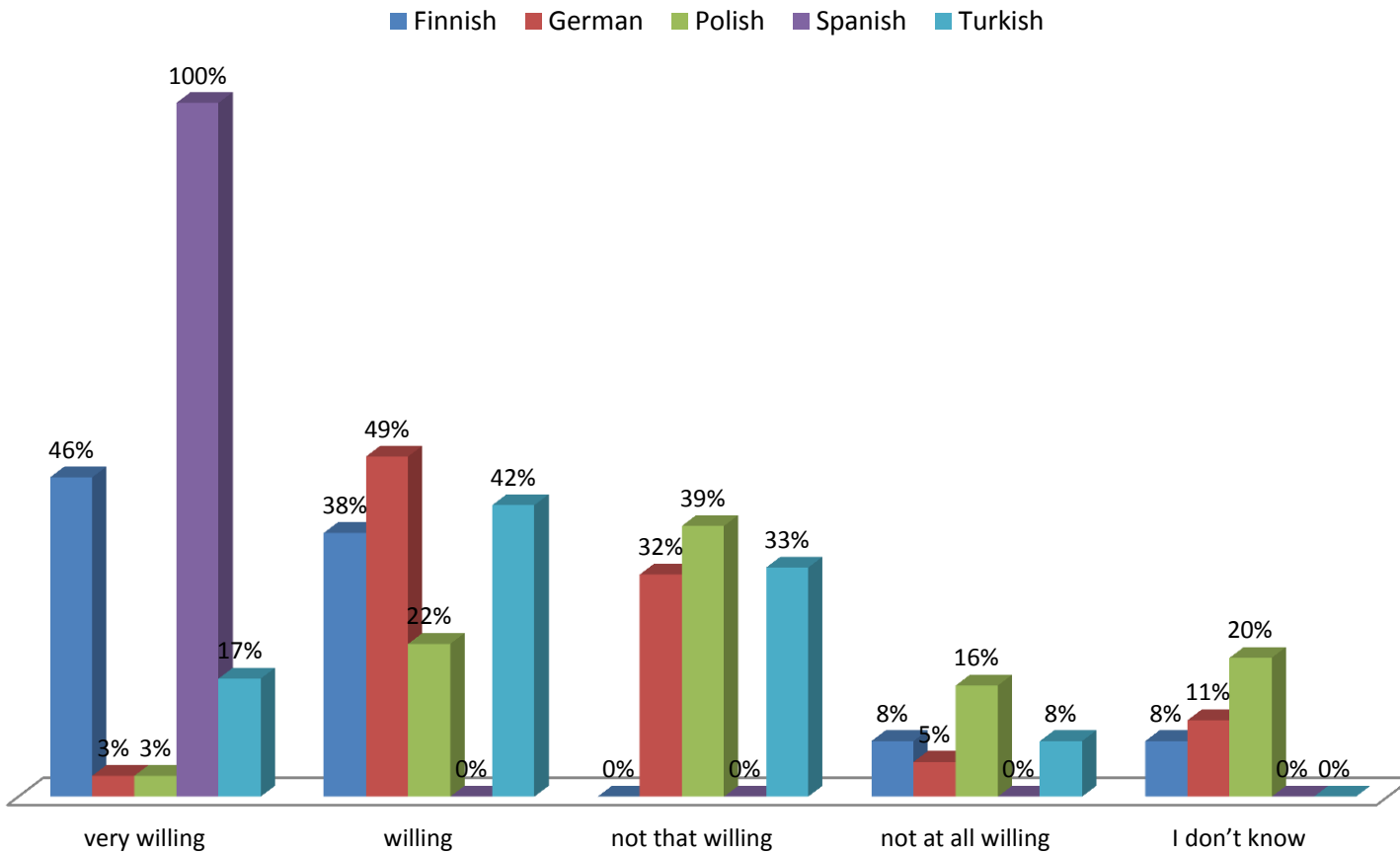

6e) Everyone has the right to own property alone as well as in association with others.

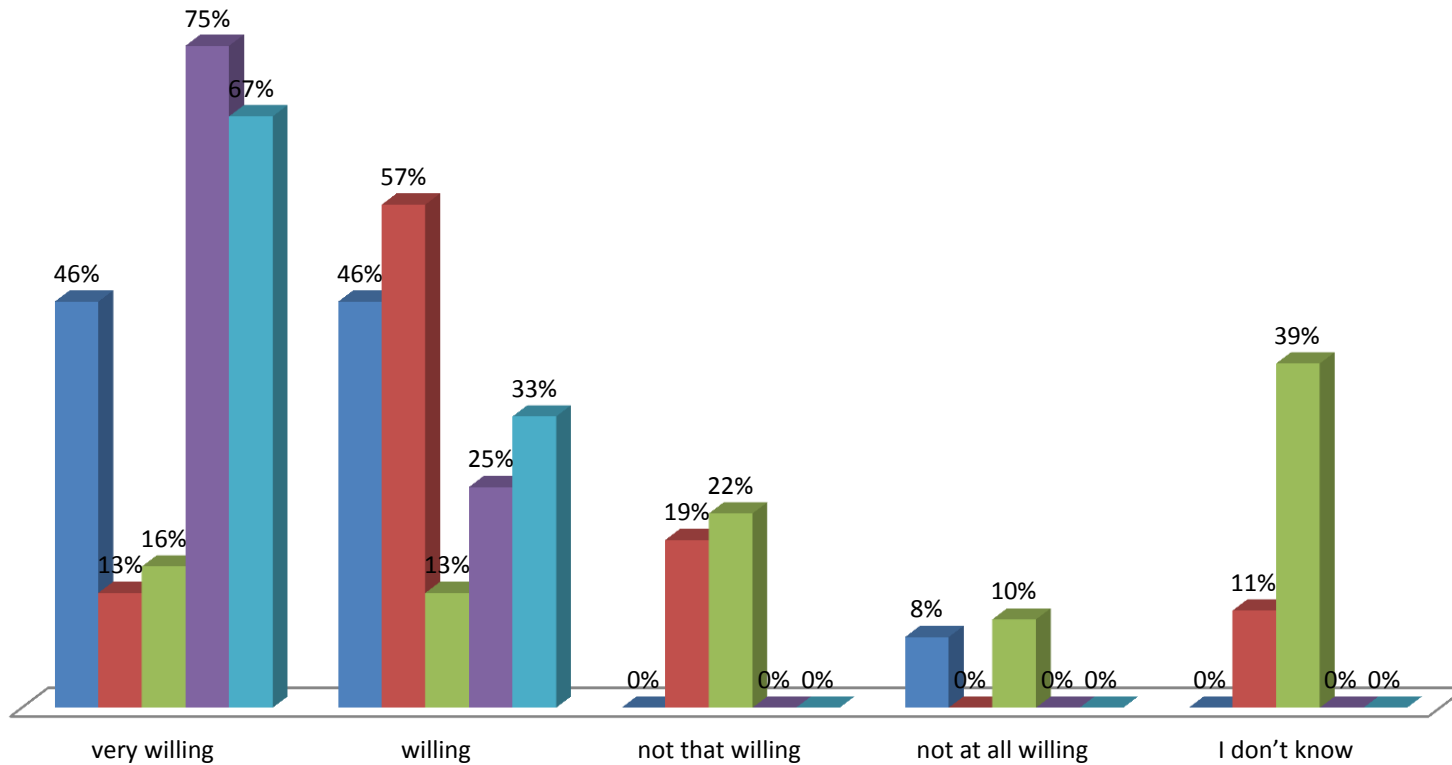


7. Would you be willing to donate money to the cause of human rights?



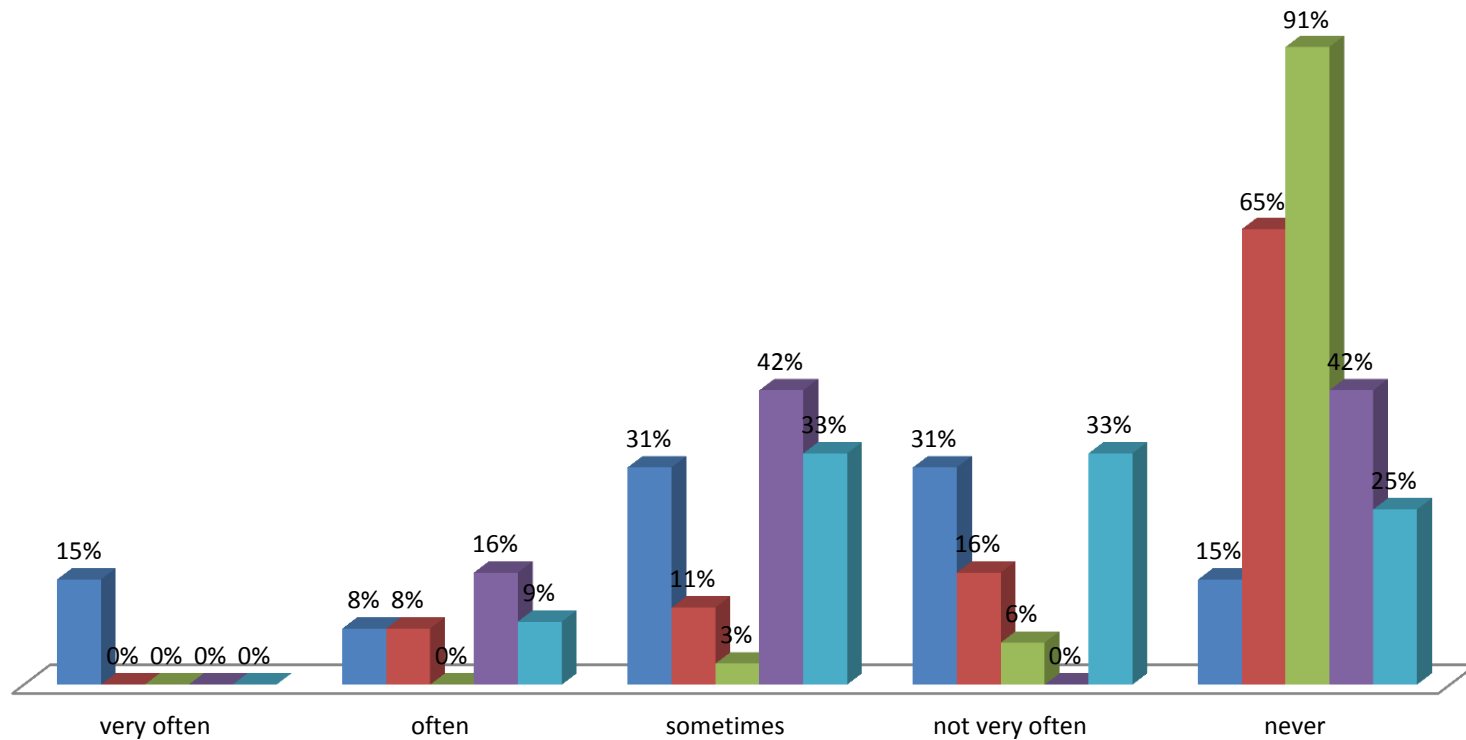
8. Would you be willing to take action against human rights violations?

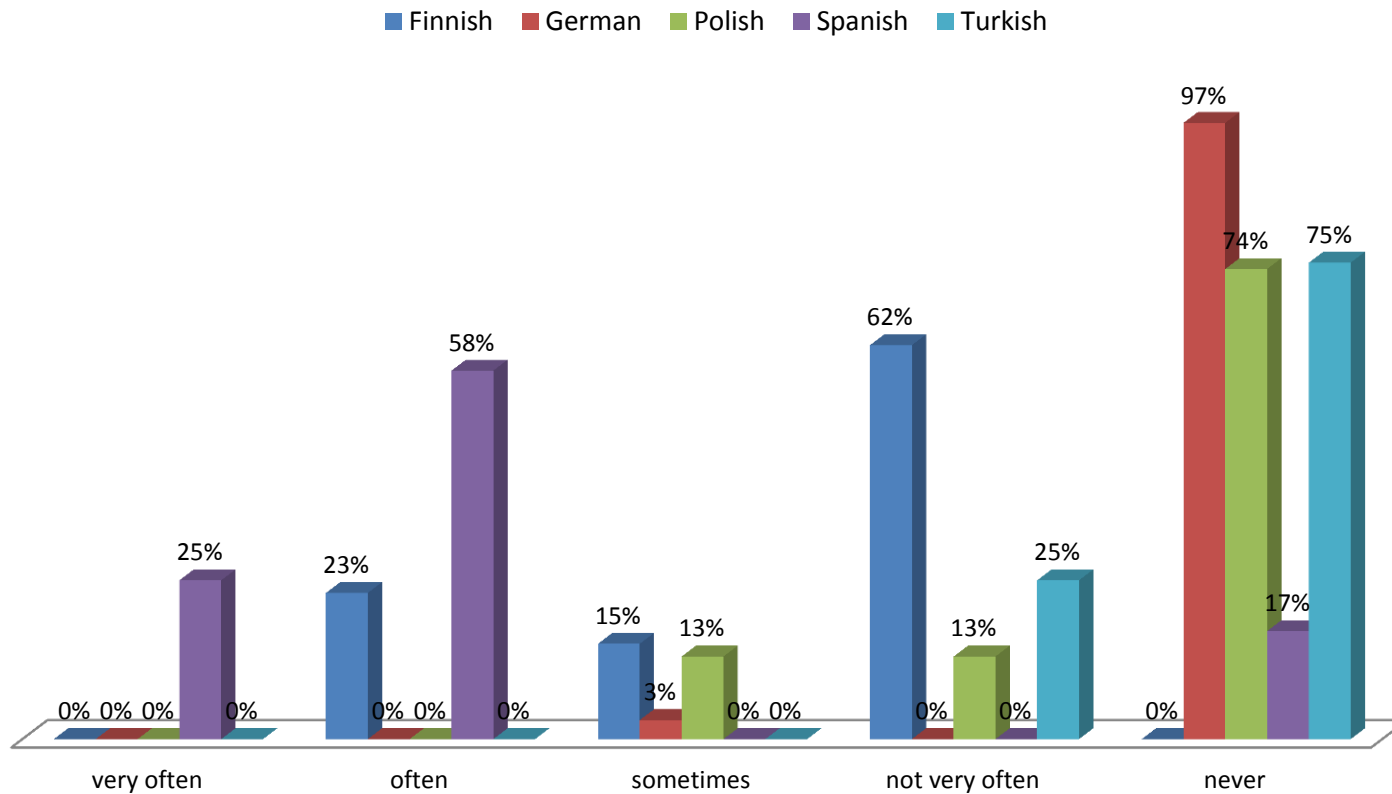


9. How often have you donated money to a human rights organisation within the last 5 years?
